

The University curriculum is updated based on input from all stakeholders such as students, teachers, industry experts, alumni and expert academicians. Revisions in structure and/or contents are made by "Boards of Studies" and forwarded to the Academic Council. Academic Council recommends the curricular revisions to BOM for final approval. Curriculum was last updated in Academic Year 2020-21.

5.4	Furnish details of the following aspects of curriculum design: Innovation such as modular curricula Inter/multidisciplinary approach	The curriculum for all undergraduate and postgraduate study programs in the University is based on trimester pattern of studies. This pattern ensures that more courses are offered in the program and students are highly engaged during the entire tenure of the program. University follows choice-based credit system (CBCS) and offers open electives across disciplines. University has a unique Peace Curriculum as an integral part of all study programs of higher education in the University. The peace studies need to add Peace courses titles University also offers audit courses in Yoga and Meditation. Two faculty teaching model (where two teachers simultaneously conduct a class) is followed in the University for better engagement with the students and to follow active learning methods. This innovative pedagogy is effective in bridging all possible learning gaps. As a part of University academic framework, National/International Study tours are conducted for imparting experiential learning to the students in reputed Industries. Also Rural Immersion Projects are designed to give an exposure to students about the environment and issues of rural landscape and how modern technology and management concepts can be applied to improvise the rural society's living condition which will help for bridging the gap between Rural and Urban India. Mentor and Mentee scheme is adopted in the University, where regular sessions of mentors with their mentees are conducted to help in overall development of students. The University is focusing on developing Sports Culture and fostering other Cultural activities through regular coaching, expert lectures in the field of sports and nutrition, Students Clubs, inter class and Inter University sports meets throughout the year.

Following method is followed by University for evaluation of answer scripts: 1. The answer sheets after masking of student identity, are given to the internal evaluator appointed by Board of Studies (BoS) for respective programme / course considering his/her year of experience for subject. 2. The course chairman or a person appointed by course chairman performs moderation of all answer sheets that have scored marks less than 40% and more than 80% of maximum marks of that course. The moderation is also carried out randomly for 3% of total answer sheets scoring marks between 40% and 80% of maximum marks. The passing marks are 40% of the maximum marks for that course. 3. After the declaration of results, if student is unsatisfied with his / her evaluation, the photocopy of his/her answer sheet is given on payment of prescribed fees. Further, he/she can apply for revaluation and re-totaling within five days after declaration of the result. 4. External experts are appointed for Revaluation and Retotaling.

To ensure objectivity and transparency, MIT-WPU University has adopted the following policy for constitution of boards of paper setters, examiners and invigilators for end semester Theory and Practical examinations: (a) Each concerned Head-of-Department prepares a list of course experts, teaching different subjects/course/papers; in consultation with teachers. List so prepared is placed before the undergraduate & postgraduate Board of Studies. (b) The list is considered in the meeting of the UG/PG Board of Studies. The UG/PG Board of Studies approves a panel of examiners for each course. (c) Out of the panel of paper setters and examiners, the Controller of Examination approve the name of examiners. (d) The Controller of Examination communicates with the approved examiners and call the paper setters in the period declared for paper setting with the paper setting material. Utmost care is exercised to maintain complete secrecy in implementation of the entire process.

Composition of BOS

As per Statues of MIT-WPU, a Board of Studies shall be constituted for one School or more than one Schools clubbed together, as may be decided by the Dean of the Faculty concerned. It shall comprise of:

- 1. Head of the School Chairman. If one Board has been constituted for more than one School, the Chairman will be nominated by the Dean of the Faculty concerned.
- 2. Three (3) teachers, each from the category of Professors, Associate Professors and Assistant Professors of the Schools of which one of the persons must be the one designing a particular course.
- 3. Three (3) Experts with more than 15 (fifteen) years of experience in Industry / University / Research Organization / NGOs, etc. nominated by the Vice-Chancellor (Name shall be recommended by respective Deans / Associate Deans for this category).
- 4. Two additional members from the student's category (preferably) one from UG and one from PG) in your respective Board of Studies. This is the minimum requirement and the Heads of Schools may include invited members (experts) as and when required.

Composition of Academic Council:

- (a) The Academic Council shall be the principal academic body of the University and shall, subject to the provisions of this Act and the rules, statutes and ordinances made thereunder, coordinate and exercise general supervision over the academic policies of the University. It is constituted as follows:
 - i. The Vice-Chancellor- (Chairman)
 - ii. Deans of Faculties.
 - iii. All Directors of constituent Schools / Colleges of the University.

		 iv. The President may appoint up to 5 persons of academic eminence to the Academic Council. (b) Registrar shall be the Member-Secretary but shall not have right to vote. (c) Members of the Academic Council nominated by the President shall hold office for a period three years.
